Jacoba's jottings... Friends, I wrote this article on Saturday, before the incident on Sunday, April 28. I am leaving the article as I wrote it on Saturday. I will write more about the incident on page 2.

The disciple Thomas is often called "Doubting Thomas," a name that is frequently given to anyone who doubts or questions. I wonder if Thomas could also be experienced as courageous. Don't you think it would have taken courage to question the Resurrection when the other disciples (his friends, his companions) were so sure they had seen the Risen Lord? When others are convinced they know the truth, to admit we want more information lays us open too often to ridicule. It landed Thomas with his nick-name – the doubter.

Earlier, before his crucifixion, Jesus was talking about going to prepare a place for us in his Father's house, and that his followers would know the way. Thomas was the one who admitted, "Lord we do not know where you are going." Others likely wondered what Jesus was saying, however they remained silent. Thomas boldly asked the question. While Jesus was always open to questions, I imagine it took Thomas some courage to admit that he did not understand what Jesus was teaching.

You might remember in John 11, after the death of Lazarus when Jesus announced that he was returning to Judea, the other disciples tried to dissuade him. They knew the religious authorities were planning to stone Jesus. Thomas said to the other disciples, "Let us go too, that we may die with Jesus." It seems to me that Thomas was the brave one.

Courage is needed any time one person stands up and announces an opinion that is different than the understandings of others. It takes courage to say, "I disagree," "I need more evidence," "I have questions," when we are surrounded by folks who are of one mind. Thomas had the courage to speak of his doubt. He had the courage to stand alone. He was also the one in the Gospel of John who when Jesus showed him his wounds, responded "My Lord, and my God!"

We live in a society when it takes courage to acknowledge a different opinion even in our families. It takes courage to hold onto what we believe. It takes courage to stand alone. There are times when Jesus followers must have courage. We need courage to speak the truth, sometimes to question the truth others proclaim, to stand up for our faith in Jesus and to walk in his ways when fewer and fewer people claim him as their Lord and their God. I have been thinking and reading a bit about courage. I wish I were braver at times in claiming my faith and in who I am and whose I am. In the next few weeks, I plan to preach on having courage. We will begin with the book of Acts and then I will share with you some stories of brave, courageous people in the Bible.

<u>Pastor Jacoba's 2nd Page...</u> AN INTRUDER IN WORSHIP

On Sunday, April 28, an intruder interrupted our worship service. He yelled some comments for between 20-30 seconds and then left. We never saw a weapon. Because the Safety Advisory Committee and Council had had discussions about what to do if there would be an incident our leadership reacted appropriately. The congregation and I remained calm. The police were called, arriving quickly. The individual had already interrupted services at Hillside Church and appeared to be on the way to Calvary when the police had a conversation with him. The incident caused some members to feel more vulnerable and made us all more aware of the need for safety precautions.

I have had several conversations since the event – including a meeting with the Executive Committee of the Council. The Safety Advisory Committee will meet in the coming week. For the time being, all doors will be locked during the week unless there is a planned event. If you want to come into the building, please call the church office. All the doors will be locked and checked shortly after worship begins. The east side doors have been repaired. Those who arrive late for worship will need to use the main entrance. We are asking at least two ushers to remain in the front hallway during the worship services. We will also ask the ushers to walk through the building. We ask that members be diligent in checking to see that the doors are locked when they leave the building.

Of course we do not want to over-react – at the same time, we want all to feel we have done everything we can to keep everyone safe when we are in our building.

We are also a people of faith. There is plenty of fear in our world. Yet, Jesus taught us, "Do not live in fear, little flock" John Dorhauer, President and General Minister of the UCC, shared these thoughts in a Still-Speaking Devotion this week:

"But you are not afraid. What do you know? Do you accept that nothing in this world can separate you from the love of God; and that the God who fashioned you, called you by name, and abides with you in the shadowed valleys has given you the Kindom? If you know that, you know enough. Faith instills within you an abiding orientation to faith, hope, and love. In such a soul fear cannot abide."

Friends, let us not fear, but overcome fear with love.

We heard an engaging keynote address from Rev. Franz Rigert and a sermon by Rev. Joanne Thompson, Associate Conference Minister who retires after many years of service in July.

Sue Voigt and I chaperoned four confirmands to Milwaukee. We saw the beautiful St Sava's, a Serbian Orthodox Church, ate dinner at St Ben's with the other guests, enjoyed a Brewer Game, made sandwiches at the Guest House after buying groceries for 200 sack lunches, and visited the Islamic Center. It was a good experience mixed with learning and fun.

I was very proud of our Confirmation Class who participated in the Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunday services. I washed their feet, they were our communion servers, lit and extinguished candles in the Tenebrae service and stripped the altar. Sunday morning the altar remained bare until the confirmands, acolytes, Deacons/nesses brought into our sanctuary the symbols of the resurrection.

On the 28th, the Confirmands did a very good job of sharing the faith with us. I look forward to supporting them as they confirm their faith on May 5.
