Jacoba's jottings... The New year we have awaited has begun. Many of us are wondering what this year will bring. We have some hope for a better year than 2020. Many of us are hoping for a return to normal – the normal of our recent past. My hunch is that will not happen. No matter the nature of our experiences, we cannot return to the past. Let me share three scenarios that forever change lives:

- 1. Winning the lottery, big time! YAY! However your life will never be the same. Quitting your job is suddenly an option, so is traveling or paying off your debt, generously giving to causes important to you and supporting your family. Good stuff! Still, even if you give all your winnings away, bank it all, or spend it all your life will not return to the old normal.
- 2. A major heart-attack or the doctor says you have treatable cancer. Your life will change. You may choose to live differently. Likely you will always live wondering if you will have more heart issues or if the cancer will return. even with a full recovery, your life will not return to the old normal.
- 3. Graduating from high school. Yay! You are proud of your accomplishments- as you well ought to be. There are so many options before you more schooling, enter the job market, take a year off to do mission work; join the service. And then you realize it will never be the same. Your friends will scatter- and even if you come together on breaks well, likely not everyone can come at the same time; and there are new relationships- and the pick-up ball game, just doesn't feel the same. It is all a mixed bag, isn't it? Your life will not return to the old normal.

For a few of us – the pandemic has been like the lottery – things mostly improved. For some of us the pandemic as been like a heart attack or cancer diagnosis. Hard! And others among us the pandemic has been the mixed bag of graduation – yay – and the realizations of our losses. With all three scenarios we know life will never be the same – we really can't go back to the old normal. I am in the third group. There have been some places where things have certainly improved – for me personally and in the church. I also grieve the losses the church and I have experienced and will experience.

It was so for Israel. After the Hebrews were freed from slavery and the Egyptian soldiers they rejoiced. However, in the wilderness, they longed for the meals the Egyptians provided for them as slaves and the old



normal. Yet in the midst of the challenges, they learned God was among them, feeding them and leading them to a new life. My faith is God is also in our midst. No, we will not return to the old normal — Would God want that for us? I doubt it. God weeps about the losses and the hardships some have endured — and God has plans for the us, "plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." God always hopes we will repent and accept the new life Jesus laid out for his followers. Sure, we yearn for the past — yet in

time – in the new life Jesus offers all things will work for good for those who love the Lord and lead a lives worthy of the calling to which they are called.

It is a new year. Let us give thanks for what was, realizing we can't return to the old normal. May we begin the new year with hope – watching for what God has in store for us – willing to live new lives.

20 Good Things That Happened to The United Church of Christ in 2020

I want to first say that this list is not intended to make light of any of the sorrows that were endured by the world this prior year. The agony, fear, and frustration experienced are valid. 2020 gave us, our community at Neillsville UCC, plenty of challenges and hardships. Although we are still mourning the loss of 'what could have been' I would like to challenge you to remember the good that also came in the year 2020.

I've only worked here a few months, but I did my best to gather 20 stories from the Neillsville UCC community that were either, interesting, positive, advanced us, and celebrated life and our Lord. In no particular order...

- 1. The Angel tree project continued to help many people this year. The numbers are not in yet, but it is estimated that about 200-300 children were impacted. We would like to thank the Trustees as well as the Neillsville community for allowing this to happen.
- 2. Our dear secretary Audrey Vradenburg retired after working for the UCC for over 42 years. We are sad to see Audrey leave, but share happiness with her that she can enjoy retirement and that God has blessed us with her for 42 years.
- 3. The UCC bought a new fancy-dancy camera. This allows us to take better quality video to record our services.
- 4. Speaking of cameras, the UCC is more involved in the online world than ever. Our services can now be viewed by anyone at any time. This allows for many individuals, including homebound, and those curious about the UCC, to participate in our worship.
- 5. Online technology has enabled many people to stay in contact. Zoom, gave many people opportunities to connect with others than in the past.
- 6. Over the summer, several volunteers redid the landscaping in front of our building adding beauty.
- 7. The Neillsville United Church of Christ confirmed seven student this September: Brody Bergemann, Bryce Erickson, Kole Miller, Cali Moseid, Paige Voigt, Parker Voight, and Sydney Subke. This would not have been possible without the many helpers, assistants, family members, and mentors working together.
- 8. The winter months of 2020 were mild in Neillsville compared to some years. We had some cold days but no awful blizzards or black ice patches.
- 9. Last January and February the UCC participated in the Soup-Souperbowl challenge. We we won the Neillsville competition by collecting 580 cans—however the real winners were the Food Pantries of Clark County.
- 10. The Holiday Fair went virtual and was still a success. Many beautiful items were made, donated, and bought online. Over \$2,000 were made.
- 11. We celebrated Christmas. We were not physically together, but we worshiped together. Choirs still sang beautiful hymns, God still heard our prayers, we lit our candles and let Christ's light shine in the world. In our homes, it was a small, yet humble Christmas for many.
- 12. Our children with the help of their parents and Bonnie Weyer read and acted out the Christmas story for us in the Christmas Sunday School Program. The congregation was delighted to see our kids and to hear them tell the story sing and play an instrument.
- 13. The events of 2020 caused our daily lives to come to a near stop. For many, this allowed them to think, and reconnect with themselves, their family, and God. There have been many families that have grown closer because of the stillness. I'm willing to bet that there are people who grew closer to God too.
- 14. The Mission Committee gave away cheese and butter, beef sticks etc. to the congregation, who could enjoy them themselves or share them with others and they gifted our health care workers at the Clinic and hospital in Neillsville.
- 15. The Neillsville community is lucky to have so many talented, intelligent, brave medical workers near by that are not only treating patients of Covid but are also continuing to treat and thus save and improve the lives, of many individuals.
- 16. The United Church of Christ this year has also been blessed with the work and volunteerism of several individuals. If I were to list everyone that is involved in keeping the UCC running functionally, there would be enough names to solely fill an entire newsletter on.
- 17. We got new carpet. It is pretty nifty. (See #16 for details)
- 18. Sunday School Classes took place virtually on Zoom. The children learned the Lord's Prayer and the stories of Jesus' birth.
- 19. We continued to have radio sermons, allowing more people to access us. We also mail and email out bulletins.
