**jacoba's jottings...** During my pastoral renewal time I finished reading the book "How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You are Going" by Susan Beaumont, published in 2019. She ends the book with the words from Ezra 3:11-13 I quoted above. As we prepare to celebrate Thanksgiving these words strike me as fitting for many of our families. There are many places in our lives where some of us are rejoicing and some of us are weeping because of how life is for us today.

Let me share a little context. As you may have realized several of the prophets in the Bible speak about how things were before, during and after Israel's exile from their homeland. Ezra writes in the days when Israel at long last is back home again. The people are rebuilding the temple which the Babylonians had destroyed. They are grateful as a new foundation is laid shouting with joy. However, as always when we rebuild what was, it is not quite the same. The priests saw the changes and loudly wept. As the text said the joy-filled shouting and the weeping was so great no one could distinguish between them.

Some of us long for the good old days as the older priests did – yearning for the days when the entire family gathered around the Thanksgiving Table. We remember fondly families sitting together in the pew, all of them lifting their voices in song while Grandma showed the one who just learning how to read where the words were in the hymnal. We remember talking with friends, who maybe thought differently than we did, however our opinions did not divide us.

Others among us, while missing what was, see the opportunities before us. Yes, things are different in our families, in the church and in our relationships; however, we see a future filled with hope. We are grateful for the new beginnings and new possibilities. We might wish for days past – yet we rejoice when our youth have found good jobs and strong relationships even knowing they might not be able to come home for Thanksgiving. We celebrate what was, while also realizing sometimes we must let go of what was because it holds us back, or because our priorities or interests have changed.

When our feelings, opinions, decisions are so different from one another that some of us are shouting for joy and some of us are weeping aloud it can be difficult to be together. Maybe as in the days of Ezra we need to let each one be where they are -some rejoicing, some weeping while confessing God loves us all.

As we weep and rejoice what can we together celebrate or lament? Israel was home – I bet everyone was glad about that. And I bet everyone grieved those who had not survived exile. In our day, may we rejoice and weep according to our experiences- honor our differences, acknowledge one another's joys and sorrows and find the places where we can all give thanks. I am sure you can find some common experiences for which you can give thanks at your dinner table, in the church and in your relationships. Let us have compassion for one another and follow Jesus who loves all of us bringing us together at His Table and our tables.

# Spirit of Generosity: A Testimonial

One evening this past August, I couldn't sleep due to an emergency light flashing at the former hospital across the street from us. Why it kept flashing after the police had arrived hours earlier, I do not know, yet the white strobing light coming through our window and flashing on the bedroom wall seemed to be calling me to my feet.

I decided to get up and try to put myself to sleep by reading from a book on pruning shrubs that I had placed on the kitchen table earlier that evening. The reading, not accomplishing any drowsiness, I decided to turn on the TV and, possibly, fall asleep to a movie in an effort to ignore and forget that flashing white light that was, seemingly, penetrating the interior of my home.

Oddly, with Christmas being some distance away, the movie, "A Christmas Carrol," starring George C. Scott, was on the TV. Most of us recall Ebenezer Scrooge, and how his surname became used as a synonym for an overabundance of frugality, and his use of the phrase, "Bah, humbug" as he applied it to Christmas activities.

Of course, I was familiar with the story, *A Christmas Carrol*, from beginning to end, but only caught the ending on that early morning. When I tuned into the movie, Scrooge was taken by one of the spirits to his Christmas Future, and it was at that time in the movie where he was finally moved to a reigniting of his Christmas spirit...and the generosity and kindnesses that he had once possessed as a young man had been reinstalled.

At that moment, when he bought the turkey for Tiny Tim's Christmas dinner and had given Tim's father a doubling of wages---it was at that point where I was reminded, and truly moved, of how my spirit of generosity had waned over the years---and I, along with Ebenezer, was taken back to recapturing my <u>spirit of giving</u>.

I felt so melancholy that tears came to my eyes. I thought to myself, why am I feeling so sad when I just watched, although only a fictional character, a man who had gone from a grumpy old tight-wad, thinking that Christmas was only an event held for commercial purposes, to a man who re-discovered the true meaning of giving---where Christ and generosity was put back into his Christmas? Why was this making me sad...and not happy? Sad, I conclude, because I, like Ebenezer, had let my spirit of generous giving, fade.

How, was the spirit of giving now re-imbedded into Ebenezer? I believe that if the original novel's author, Charles Dickens, had written a sequel using the same character, it would have gone on to describing Ebenezer's as a truly generous and kind-hearted man, with an ongoing, bountiful, and festive generosity of spirit and giving---a healthy spirit of generosity that continued well into his remaining years.

Now, you ask, what does a flashing white light waking me in the early morning, Ebenezer, and Christmas time, have to do with us here and now? I believe daily, our spirit of generosity is tested. And, it is demonstrated with our giving of our talents, time, and treasures to our church and its missions.

For many, it doesn't take a walk alongside the Spirit of our Futures to entice us to give; it doesn't take a flash of light to awaken us; and it doesn't take an old movie to regenerate our generosity. Yet, some, like me, do require reminders that our generosity may have stalled, and our enthusiasm towards giving does need occasional stimulation.

Mission & Outreach Report

Our committee met and discussed the future meal give-aways. The October meal was prepared by members of the Neillsville PEO. 80 meals were prepared. The meal was Shepard's Pie Soup, mashed potatoes, cheese and biscuits. Our meals in November and December will be prepared with the help of the Optimist's Club.

It was voted on to give a donation to Shirley's House of Hope, Marshfield. Their goal is to Rebuild, Renew and Restore lives of women and children hurting from domestic violence along with alcohol and drug addictions. A donation was given to NewStart. Through the program NewStart, former inmates can chat with volunteers about the resources available that can help get them on their feet, and be provided clothing, food, and a safe place to go. This is a non-profit that meets with prisoners released from the Clark County Jail and discusses resources that can help them while living in the area. Money was also given to Hannah Center a home for young mothers with children. It is a Goal Based Program for women with children, a pregnant woman or a single woman in crisis.

Our next meal give-away is November 21<sup>st</sup>. Plan to take a meal for yourself or a neighbor, friend or someone in need of a home cooked meal. Curbside pick up will be 10:45-11:15.

### **CLERGY RENEWAL GRANT**

On my leave for renewal, I spent several days at Moon Beach Camp and at Daycholah Center. It was a time for reconnecting with nature, the Holy, reading, visiting with a few colleagues and Don and Joy Abel, and catching up at home. Walking the labyrinth is my go-to form of prayer; both camps have labyrinths A labyrinth is a circular maze using the same entrance and exit. For me, as I move toward the center of the



labyrinth, I too am centered and I hear God's guidance, assurance, encouragement as I move back out of the labyrinth. If you have been in Phoenix Park in Eau Claire, you may have seen a labyrinth.

- I also finished reading the book <u>How to Lead when You Don't Know Where You're Going</u> by Susan Beaumont. Written in 2019 it was intended to address the decline of the mainline institutional Church helping church leaders to move into a future yet unknown. Liminality is that time between when we feel some clarity and things are going well – and then slowly or quickly, sometimes expected, sometimes unexpected there are changes and we do not know what the future holds. Susan wrote the book to support churches going through the liminal time.
- A few of the things I picked up I underlined a good portion of this book as have my colleagues who read the book.
  - † To be curious about what is taking place and where it might lead.
  - † To move from knowing to unknowing
  - † To move from advocating to attending
  - † To move from striving to surrender
  - † To seek God's guidance and tend the soul of the institution.
  - † To know that to be a leader in liminal time will take patience, listening to the Spirit while paying attention to the values of the institution, taking risks, embracing failure, monitoring anxiety, being open to what emerges, finding coherence.
  - \* Some people will rejoice in the new beginning as it emerges, and some will weep because what was is no more.

I commend the book to you and am willing to discuss it with those interested in reading it.
