Dear Friends and Members of the United Church of Christ, Neillsville,

The following is part of a message sent out recently by Rev. Franz Rigert, our UCC WI Conference Minister. I found his message to be meaningful and thought I should share it with you. I hope you gain a sense of peace from wise words.

#### From Rev. Franz Rigert In his "Spiritual Reflection and Conference Up-Date" 8/30/22:

"Nearly 50 years ago, my childhood buddy Frazier and I spent hot August days catching crayfish in the creek that runs through Delavan. Our favorite spot was under the Washington Avenue bridge, where the little crawdaddies would hide from the bright sunlight. I vividly remember how dark it got as we ventured under the bridge. In the middle we could barely see each other, but as we pushed ahead to the other side it gradually became light until the sun's rays fell on us once again.

Throughout the pandemic, I have often returned to this image of passing from light into darkness. It's a wonderful metaphor for the "liminal space" through which we continue to journey daily.

Limin is the Latin word for threshold, or passageway, such as an "under the bridge" journey between an experience we have known and loved and a new reality not yet fully clear to us. Abraham and Sarah set out on such a journey from the familiar surroundings of their homeland. So did Ruth the Moabite in accompanying Naomi to Judea. The Hebrew people meandered uncertainly after the exodus from Egypt and again after the Babylonian captivity. All who followed Jesus experienced liminal unknowns.

COVID's full effect on the Church remains unclear. We are no longer in deep darkness, but we certainly have not emerged yet from under the bridge. We hold in tension notions of returning *and* adapting, preserving what once was *and* imagining what will be. Living in a liminal space can be exhausting yet energizing. To be sure, the uncertainty produces anxiety. Fortunately, some of the changes in life and work, forced by the pandemic, have resulted in new efficiencies and better self-care.

My spiritual mantra lately is three simple words: *patience, prayer, possibilities*. Patience because we trust God is doing a new thing that will unfold in due time. Prayer because this centers us in God's love and grace rather than in endless worries and weariness. Possibilities because in Christ all things work together for good when we discern through the Spirit and stay rooted in the Word."

I think his message is most appropriate as we emerge from difficult times. We may not be out from under the bridge but this church, in my opinion, is moving rapidly into the sunlight. Thanks be to God! Grace and peace,

Neighbors in Need is one of the "five for five" missions of the UCC church. Neighbors in Need the "unfailing love" offering is focused on supporting organizations and projects that are serving our homeless and immigrant neighbors or communities.

One third of the NIN funds support the council for American Indian Ministry. Two thirds of this offering is used by UCC's Justice and Witness ministries to provide funding grants to UCC churches and organizations leading justice initiatives, advocacy efforts and direct projects to their communities. Recently such a relief program was set up for the covid pandemic.

This offering is typically taken along with World Wide Communion Sunday in October. However, you may donate at any time by dropping your donation at the church, through our website or VANCO on line.

## **Our Church's Wider Mission**

Since the Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM) may be the least understood of the missions that our church is involved with, it is the intent of this article to assist the members of the congregation in better understanding where the OCWM fits into our church's mission work, as well as where our contributions to this mission are being used.

To best remind the reader where the Our Church's Wider Mission fits into our church's mission work, the OCWM is <u>one</u> of the missions included in the often used phrase, "Five for Five."

The Five for Five includes the:

- Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM)
- One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS)
- Strengthen the Church (STC)
- Neighbors in Need (NIN
- Christmas Fund

Although all of the above offerings are part of the Five for Five, or UCC's Wider Mission, we single out the OCWM as a "broader mission," being a budgeted amount that is provided to the UCC for basic and wider church support. While in contrast, the remaining four are considered "special missions," in that contributions by individual members of the congregation to these distinct missions go for more specific needs and causes.

#### **OCWM Basic Operating Support**

According to Rev. Dr. John C. Dorhauer, (Past General Minister and President of UCC), the OCWM "Serves an array of ministries across the life of the denomination"

It has already been emphasized here that the OCWM contributes to the wider, <u>basic</u> support of the UCC's mission.

Our local church sends its budgeted OCWM gift to the Conference each year. In turn our Conference decides what percentage of our gift goes to conference work and what percentage is sent to the national setting of the UCC.

That national setting includes UCC's commitments to the United Church Camps, Inc., the Wisconsin Council of Health and Human Services agencies, our educational ministries connected to the UCC, and the Wisconsin Council of Churches. It goes to support students who answer the call to the ministry, ministries around the globe, and for social justice.

The Rev. Dr. James Moos best describes the use of this basic support in a short YouTube video foun d on the UCC website.
