## ***SEPTEMBER 2025 NEWSLETTER***

*As they sat down to eat, Jesus took the bread and blessed it. Then he broke it and gave it to them. Suddenly, their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. Luke 24:30-31a*

Dear Friends,

As I write this letter, I am still on a bit of a high from our Pancake Extravaganza - what a glorious day! Fellowship hall was filled with people of all ages enjoying a variety of pancakes and friendship. I could hear laughter and joy drifting up the stairs. The air fairly tingled with the energy of all these people gathered together in Christian fellowship.

Mingled among the familiar faces of our congregation were some new faces. I don't know how many of these visitors came just for the pancakes or how many came to be among friends and family. When we welcomed them to break bread with us, we were all gifted with the opportunity to recognize the presence of Jesus among us.

There is something about breaking bread together, sitting down and eating at one table, that opens our hearts in a new way. We aren't just providing food; we are sharing community. It is no coincidence that the disciples who encountered Jesus on the road to Emmaus didn't recognize him until they broke bread together. All the teaching and talking on their trip was good - but it was in eating together that they finally recognized Christ.

In much the same way, we can offer teaching and worship, but it is most often in the breaking of bread together that we fully recognize Christ in our midst. Our Pancake Extravaganza was a great opportunity to supplement our income and invite visitors to worship, but those metrics are not the most important part of our mission as Christians. The greatest joy of the day was sharing the love of Jesus with one another and reaching out that all may recognize Jesus in us.

Jesus didn't sit in one place waiting for people to come to him - he went out to the community and shared the good news of God's love and mercy wherever he went. The disciples did the same - taking the good news to the people, not worrying about how many people attend weekly worship services or how much money is in the offering plate. We are reminded that, for all their witnessing and teaching, the greatest impact on the community was often in breaking bread together. This is our calling, dear friends, to go out and share the good news, to sit and commune with one another, to see the face of Christ in those around us and let them know the love of Christ through us.

May God bless you in your sharing and serving. May God open your eyes to recognize Jesus in our midst, wherever you go.

## Wednesday Night Bible Study

**Starting Wednesday, September 10, 2025,** we will be offering an evening Bible study in addition to our Tuesday afternoon gathering. We will meet at 6 p.m. in the church lounge for a different kind of study. Pastor Julie will lead IMMERSION BIBLE STUDIES. Our first study will be eight weeks, focusing on the book of Acts and the early church.

Journey inside the pages of scripture, and you'll meet a personal God who enters individual lives and begins a creative work from the inside out. IMMERSION BIBLE STUDIES remain true to scripture but always ask, "Where are you in your life? What do you struggle with? What makes you rejoice?" Then it helps you read the scriptures to discover their deep, abiding truths.

IMMERSION is about God and God's Word, and it is also about you - not just your thoughts, but your feelings and your faith. In each study, you will prayerfully read the scripture and reflect on it. Then we will engage it in three ways:

### ***Claim Your Story***

Through stories and questions, think about your life, with its struggles and joys.

### ***Enter the Bible Story***

Explore scripture and consider what God is saying to you.

### ***Live the Story***

Reflect on what you have discovered, and put it into practice in your life.

The program will feature Natalie Erpenbach, a retired CPA and current Treasurer of the Clark County Community Foundation Inc. Erpenbach will explain what types of assets can be used to make contributions (donations) to tax-exempt charitable organizations and in particular, information on how the use of a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is helpful. Owners of eligible IRA accounts can usually use QCDs to transfer all, or part of an annual minimum required distribution to one or more qualified charitable organizations.

To give further examples of what can be accomplished, three UCC members will share how they have used their retirement account's required minimum distribution to establish financial legacies that are "dear to their hearts"!

Erpenbach lives in Neillsville with her husband Paul, is a mother, grandmother and volunteers for several area non-profits and government organizations.

The meeting was held on Monday, June 23, 2025 in the Fellowship Hall at the Neillsville United Church of Christ.

Moderator Vine called the meeting to order at 5:32 PM.

### **Attendance**

Council Members Present: Trustee Representative Doris Bakker, Christian Education Representative Stephanie Heck, Vice Moderator Barb Petkovsek, Moderator Paul Vine, Deacons Representative Karlene Wallace, and Treasurer Bonnie Weyer.

Others in Attendance: Pastor Julie and Allan Hoesly (left at 5:48 PM).

### **Prayer**

Pastor Julie guided the committee with a prayer.

### **Retirement Announcement**

Allan Hoesly informed the Council that he will be retiring from his position of performing the audio-video job duties for the church and funeral services as of December 31, 2025. Allan suggested that there needs to be more than one or two volunteers to be willing to learn these duties before the start of 2026.

Pastor will have an announcement developed for the upcoming newsletters asking for volunteers.

### **Investment Committee Suggestion**

Allan Hoesly stated that the Investment Committee would highly suggest that the donation to the church made by Eileen Zank should not be split into multiply accounts for future use but to be placed into the Investment funds.

***Allan Hoesly left the meeting at this time.***

### **Minutes**

Motion by Barb Petkovsek, seconded by Bonnie Weyer to approve the minutes of the April 21, 2025 meeting. Voice vote taken with all "aye;" motion carried.

### **Financial Report**

Motion by Stephanie Heck, seconded by Karlene Wallace to approve the financial report as presented by Bonnie Weyer reading Assistant Treasurer Don Quicker's written report. Voice vote taken with all "aye;" motion carried.

## **New Business**

### Eileen Zank Gift

A very generous donation of \$15,000 was made by Eileen Zank, who was a longtime member of the Neillsville United Church of Christ and served as one (1) of our organists for many years. Discussion on possible uses of this donation were to offset our negative operating fund and pay for the organist fees for a year and/or special music events held at our church.

Motion by Bonnie Weyer, seconded by Stephanie Heck to table this agenda item until our next meeting. Voice vote taken with all "aye;" motion carried.

### Audio-Visual Schedule

With Allan Hoesly's retirement announcement, Bonnie Weyer volunteered to create an audio-visual schedule, like the one she manages for PowerPoint. Bonnie suggested that if anyone knows of someone that would be willing to run the equipment to contact them to see if they would be willing to help.

### Alcohol Policy

Pastor Julie shared that she was approached, by some groups using the church, if alcohol can be used on the church premises. Pastor Julie checked with other UCC churches to see if they allow alcohol on the premises and the response was no, except for communion wine. It could also be an insurance issue, who is responsible if someone leaves and gets into an accident. The church should be a safe place for all people including those that are recovering addicts.

Motion by Doris Bakker, seconded by Karlene Wallace to make an addendum to the by-laws that no alcohol is allowed on the premises of the church, except for communion wine for communion services. Voice vote taken with all "aye;" motion carried.

Bonnie Weyer shared a handout of camp cost per attendee, with the breakdown of the association camp scholarships and the Ray Fund. The final cost of the 2025 camp scholarships from the Ray Fund will be \$9,902.25.


